Long may his good health con-tinue – and make sure his message does not go unheard.

Sir Ivan's tribute to 'perfect wife of a politician'

Former Burton MP Sir Ivan Lawrence has paid tribute to his "most incredible" wife Gloria after she lost her battle

with cancer.
Gloria Lawrence, 76, who lived in Shepperton, Surrey, died at midnight last Tuesday after an 18-month battle with lung cancer that had spread

As well as supporting her husband as a barrister and MP, Gloria had been a well-loved Blue Badge tour guide based in Burton and specialised in tours of British stately homes for rich American tourists.

Sir Ivan, now 79, who held the parliamentary seat for Burton from 1974 to 1997, lost 45-year-old daughter, Rachel, to lung failure because of cystic fibrosis three years ago and he said that he now has two holes in his life.

He said: "Gloria was the most incredible lady. I was totally devoted to her because she was so lovely. We were a little team and we did everything we

together.
"Losing Rachel was a great hole in my life. Now there are two holes blown in my life, and this is the second one."

Gloria was born in Whickham, near Newcastle, and went on to study

occupational Oxford. therapy

It was at the Oxford University Progressive Jewish Society that she met Sir Ivan in 1960 when he was president of the society and studying law at university.

He said: "I thought she was gorgeous and I couldn't take my eyes off her."

Sir Ivan explained that he was not ready for marriage and so Gloria left to work in

Venice, Italy.

He said: "She said 'if you want me, come and get me', and so I did.

"I drove with my parents to go and get her. I proposed to her in a big car park outside Venice at 3am."

The pair were married at

the West London Synagogue in April 1966 and celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary earlier this year. Gloria became a literary grount but then gove up work

agent, but then gave up work in 1968 when she had their daughter Rachel and cared for her for the next 10 years.

When Sir Lawrence was voted MP for Burton in 1974, the family moved to Grove Farm, Drakelow. Gloria became a Blue Badge tour guide and continued to work until three years ago. In her spare time she was heavily involved in Burton Conservatives.

Sir Ivan said that his wife's support throughout his time as a barrister and an MP was invaluable

In 1992, they moved to Newton Road in Burton, and only recently sold the house. In their golden years the pair spent Christmas in Town and enjoyed



Gloria successfully fought

throat cancer 25 years ago and also beat breast cancer in her lifetime.

However, 18 months ago she was diagnosed with terminal lung cancer which metastasised to her brain.

A funeral for Gloria will be held at 2pm on Thursday, October 13, at Putney Vale Crematorium, followed by a wake at Cannizaro House Hotel, in Wimbledon. Anyone from Burton who knew Gloria is welcome to attend the funeral.

The Mail led Elfyn to get a lifesaving screening

A cancer survivor has heaped praise on his doctors, a foot-ball club and the Burton Mail after an article helped potentially save his life.

There was nothing unusual about the day Elfyn Parry walked into Measham petrol station and picked up a copy of the Burton Mail – he felt well and had no health con-

It just happened that on this day the Mail had run a page three article on a prostate screening session due to take place at the Pirelli Stadium in a jointly supported event with Burton Albion and Queen's Hospital.

Reading the article, Mr Parry, 73, decided he would like to take the opportunity to be screened. It was arguably the best decision he has ever

Mr Parry lives in Oak-thorpe with his wife of 19 years, Fiona. He said: "I thought it was a good article when I read it and even though there was no indic-ation there was anything wrong, I thought I would go

"They did a rectal examination and a blood test. I went home and was glad it was out of the way and didn't really think about it again.

"That was until a letter arrived the following week asking me to go into hospital. They said my PSA (prostate specific antigen) level was high and I had a biopsy.

"Another week later and

the test results came back. They weren't good.

Mr Parry was diagnosed with prostate cancer and then underwent full body MRI scans and faced a nervous wait to find out if it had spread to other parts of his

Thankfully the early detection of the disease meant these scans came back clear meaning surgery was an option rather than chemotherapy. On May 25 of this year, just two months after he read the Burton Mail article, the retired geologist had his prostate removed by Mr Alan Doherty and his team at Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Birmingham.

The operation was a success and as he recovered from the surgery Mr Parry waited for news on the cancer.


On July 7 he heard the magical words he had been waiting for – 'you are cancer

Mr Parry said: "I just felt very fortunate that on that morning I picked up the newspaper and read what was happening at Burton Albion. "I am grateful to the news-

paper, to the football club and to Jyoti Shah and her team at Burton, and Mr Doherty and his colleagues in Birming-

Doctors had described Mr Parry's cancer as aggressive, and the early detection almost certainly significantly increased to the chances of win-

ning his battle.

Burton Albion Football Club's link-up with Queen's Hospital in offering cancer screening over a weekend in March saw more than 100 men have their prostate examined.

Demand was high and doctors even had to turn some away as it proved impossible to screen everyone that came

along.

The hope now is that screening will return to the stadium, and that on a national scale this is made more available to men.

Jyoti Shah is the consult-

ant urological surgeon at Queen's Hospital and was

instrumental in the treat-ment of Mr Parry. She said following the Burton Albion event: "There is certainly a real willingness in the community to come forward for the checks. We had to turn away 87 men who called the hospital and a further 50 who contacted Burton Albion as

we were oversubscribed.

"We'll be appealing for the commissioners to provide the funding required to make this happen again. If anyone has any concerns about their protects in the about their prostate in the meantime they should go and have a discussion with their GP."

John Widdowson, from Burton Albion Community Trust, said: "We're looking at the next steps of how we support this again. "It was a massive team

effort to make this happen and the trust is behind any efforts to do this again and, if possible, expand it." SPORT
