Families of prostate cancer victims get vital help

A support group to help patients and families diagnosed with prostate cancer has been launched by the Burton Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. It has been cham-pioned by the chairman of Burton Albion Football Club, Ben Robinson.

Around 25 men, along their partners, were welcomed to Burton Albion's Pirelli Stadium in late January to form-ally launch the group along-side Queen's Hospital clinicians. They have worked hard to raise awareness of the illness, which is the most common cancer among men.

The clinicians held successful sessions in 2016 when more than 100 men screened for the condition, including Elfyn Parry, 73, of Oakthorpe, who was given the all-clear following sur-

He went to screenings at venues including the Pirelli Stadium, as both Ben Robinson, who launched the event, and the Burton Albion Community Trust, have been strong supporters of the trust's prostate cancer awareness events.

Mr Parry told the Burton Mail: "I want the message to get out there of how import-

ant prostate cancer screening is. The Burton Albion screening was well organised and there should be more like that. Of the 100 men screened I understand nine of them were found to have cancer.

"There will be others in the Burton area who have prostate cancer but don't know it. We need more of these screenings and people need to take advantage of them." them.

Another Burton Mail reader, who wished to remain anonymous said: "I thank the Burton Mail, Burton Albion Football Club and Jyoti Shah and her team for providing the screening event in March.

"I too was diagnosed with an aggressive prostate can-cer. The treatment recom-mended for me was 37 sessions of external beam radio therapy in Derby, which I have just completed. I now await the results but am very optimistic. I still do not know why I signed up for the screening as I had no symptoms other than needing the loo in the night which I had put down to age.

"I was walking for at least two hours a day with my dogs and felt perfectly fit. "The radiotherapy did not affect me at all other than in

the late evenings I was a little tired. I am now a vocal advocate that all men should get

tested just in case and do hope that another screening

can be held at the club."
Throughout the sessions held last year, abnormalities requiring treatment were found in nine men.

The purpose of setting up the group is to provide likeminded people with a shared connection and facilitate support in the form of meetings, information sessions or social gatherings.

Consultant urological surgeon Jyoti Shah said: "We want the men to own and run the group and let them tell us what they want to get from it and how we can support them. The initial group of 25 men have all had surgery so they have had similar treatment and will likely to be needing answers to similar

"We want to open this out eventually to anyone from Burton and the surrounding areas who has had or is living with, prostate cancer. The launch event was successful and I am looking forward to hearing from the men and their partners about how they want to take this group forward and what they want to get out of it."

Dr Magnus Harrison, medical director at Burton Hospitals, added: "The work of Jyoti and urology advanced nurse practitioner Sarah Minns in promoting prostate cancer awareness has been incredible. The support we have had from the football club has been cru-cial because it allows us to take our hospital out into the

community.
"I am sure the men and their families will benefit hugely from this group and will continue to receive expert advice and assistance from our clinicians.
