A nurse who made a name for herself by promoting the importance of prostate cancer awareness is up for a pres-tigious national award for her work in the community.

'ALL CLEAR' THANKS TO PROSTATE SCREENING

A retired publican from Stretton told the Burton Mail that prostate cancer screening at Burton Albion Football Club may have Football saved his life.

A Burton Mail article prompted Tony Webster, 70, to attend a screening session which was taking place as part of a collaboration between Burton's Queen's Hospital and the football

The examination, which led to further tests, eventually revealed he had prostate

t inevitably came as a huge shock to Mr Webster and his wife of 52 years Pauline, but now he is able to tell his story having been given the all clear.

Mr Webster, who many will know from behind the bars at the Navigation Inn and Burton Albion's old Eton Park ground, said: "My brother-in-law had been diagnosed with prostate cancer three years earlier, so when I

read the article I thought it was a good idea to be examined.

"I was told my prostate felt abnormal and after that I had a biopsy.

"Then Jyoti Shah from Queen's Hospital told me I had cancer. Just two months after the

screening, Mr Webster's prostate was removed.

He said: "It was all very

quick from the diagnosis to the operation, but that is important when you have

cancer. I can't fault anything about my treatment from start to finish. Everyone from Burton Albion, the Burton and Birmingham hospitals, my family and friends, were all brilliant, I can't thank everybody can't thank everybody enough. It is really great too that the Burton Mail are highlighting this disease, thank you."
Since his operation Mr

Webster has officially been declared cancer free by his
