Football club helps men kick cancer into touch

A successful campaign which helped diagnose eight men with prostate cancer is returning to Burton in the hope of saving more lives.

Last year, staff at Queen's Hospital, in Burton, joined forces with a team at Burton Albion Football Club to host a series of screening events and health activities to raise awareness about the most common male cancer and to help diagnose men with the condition.

The campaign was a massive success with more than 100 men going along to the Pirelli Stadium to be examined, eight of whom were subsequently found to

have cancer.
Tony Webster, 70, was one of the men who spoke to the Burton Mail after being prompted by the campaign to attend an examination, which led to further tests that revealed he had prostate cancer.

It came as a huge shock to Mr Webster and his wife of 52 years, Pauline, but after seeking the treatment he needed, Mr Webster was given the all-

Mr Webster, who many will know from behind the bar at the Navigation Inn and Burton Albion's old Eton Park ground, said: "My brother-inlaw had been diagnosed with prostate cancer a few years earlier, so when I read the

article I thought it was a good idea to be examined.

I was told my prostate felt abnormal and after that I had a biopsy. Then Jyoti Shah, from Queen's Hospital, told me I had cancer."

with Rod Gent and Elfvn Parry, whose survival Elfyn Parry, whose survival stories also appeared in the Burton Mail, things happened very quickly from there for Mr Webster.

Within days he had been referred by Miss Shah, the consultant urologist at Ouser's to Alan Deberty.

Queen's, to Alan Doherty, a surgeon at Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham.

Just two months after the screening, Mr Webster's prostate was removed.

He said: "It was all very quick from the diagnosis to the operation, but that is important when you have cancer. I can't fault anything about my treatment from start to finish. Everyone from Burton Albion, the Burton and Birmingham hospitals, my family and friends, were all brilliant - I can't thank everybody enough. It is really great, too, that the Burton Mail are highlighting this disease - thank

Both Mr and Mrs Webster now want to see screening made available to as many people as possible, and have urged men to take the oppor-

tunity available to them.

Mrs Webster, said: "I do
think that men more so than women can perhaps feel a bit embarrassed about this kind of thing - but you have to get past that any way you can as

this can really save your life.'

Since his operation, Mr Webster has officially been declared cancer free by his doctors and now Burton Albion Football Club is linking up with Queen's Hospital, once again, to offer the potential life-saving screen-

Jyoti Shah, consultant urological surgeon at the hospital, said: "Prostate cancer is the most common male cancer in the western world. The good news is that people tend to live with it rather than die because of it. This campaign is about raising awareness and dispelling the myths and about how we can help people who have to go through that journey.

"It is innovative working with a football club and it's the perfect way of reaching a large number of people who might not want to visit a doctor or a hospital, but may be more receptive to a health initiative through the football club they support in an envir-onment they are familiar

The screenings, which are aimed at men aged 50 and over, are incredibly vital, something James Beeby, director of fund-raising at Prostate Cancer UK, wants to reiterate.

He said: "One man every hour dies from prostate can-cer and it is the most common cancer in men, but we want to make prostate cancer a disease that the next generation

of men do not fear. We thank Burton Albion and Burton's Queen's Hospital for joining

Of all the eight men found to have cancer, none of them reported feeling unwell before the routine examin-

The next screening session will take place at the Pirelli Stadium in Princess

Way on Thursday, March 30. Slots are available from 8am until 5pm and any men who are interested in attending the free screening must book beforehand on 01283

Thief spat at custody officer after his arrest

A 21-year-old man who went on a shoplifting spree before damaging his father's property and spitting at a custody officer has avoided an imme-

diate jail sentence.

Jack Webster, of Welland
Road, Hilton, appeared at Southern Derbyshire Magistrates' Court recently where he admitted criminal damage and two shoplifting offences.

He admitted damaging a window, a television and a bed frame belonging to his father at an address in Washford Road, Hilton, between January 17 and February 11.

He also admitted damaging a window at the same address between February 21 and 23. as well as admitting assault ing a custody officer on Feb-

Webster also admitted a string of shoplifting offences, including stealing meals and cigarettes from Tesco, in Witham Close, Hilton, on January 14; stealing scratch cards, a drink and a carrier bag worth £26.85 from Sainsbury's, in Derby, on January 19; and failing to attend court on February 28.

He has been made the sub-

ject of an 16-week prison sentence suspended for 12 months and will have to complete 100 hours unpaid work because the series of offences culminated in him spitting at a custody officer trying to do his job and he repeatedly damaged his father's property. He was ordered to pay a

£115 victim surcharge.
