Rod ready to fight after prostate campaign uncovers his cancer

A ROTARIAN hopes the early discovery of his prostate can-cer after a football club screening session will help him to fight back against his

Rod Gent, 68, was among 113 men who took the opportunity to undergo a prostate examination at the Pirelli Stadium as part of a joint campaign between Burton Albion Community Trust and Burton's Queen's Hospital.

Prostate cancer was detected in eight of those who underwent the screening and they were referred for further

treatment.
Mr Gent, of Alrewas, is the immediate past-president of Burton Rotary Club, which was also heavily involved in the campaign, and he himself was at the Pirelli Stadium

helping to organise screenings ahead of his own.

Taking the chance to be tested himself, the discovery of his cancer has been a huge shock, but he hopes his story will encourage others to get themselves checked.

There is also the hope that funding might again be made available so that East Staffordshire locations like the Pirelli might hold more screenings in the future.

Mr Gent, who is married with children, said: "I had absolutely no idea anything was wrong and that's the case with many men when it comes to prostate cancer.

"It has been tough since and everything has moved very quickly. It was explained to

me what was happening and that I was going to need sur-

gery."
Mr Gent went in for an operation yesterday to remove his prostate, just sev-en weeks after his screening at the stadium – something he described as 'incredible', as treated him.

He said: "It's all down to Burton Albion's community

trust, to the hospital and to Jyoti and her team. If this hadn't been discovered until further down the line who knows what state I'd have been in."

The screenings were undertaken by staff from Queen's Hospital's urology depart-ment, led by consultant urological surgeon Jyoti Shah. She said: "There are tests

doctors can do but it isn't an exact science and prostate cancer can go undetected.

"It is no substitute for hav-ing a prostate actually felt for abnormalities by someone like me who spends my life treating people with prostate

cancer.
"There were 17 men we checked that we felt needed a biopsy, which just shows the success of the campaign.

All the eight men since found to have cancer have been called in for further tests and treatment – and none of them reported feeling unwell

ahead of the routine exam.

Mr Gent, speaking ahead of his surgery, added: "I'm hopeful and looking forward to getting on with life again. To others," I'd own places just get. others I'd say please just get yourself checked if you have the opportunity. I can't praise enough the care that I've been

I think going into a hospital can make people feel uncomfortable so to have screening at a football ground is a great idea.'

The hope now is that future screenings can be held. Miss Shah said: "There is certainly a real willingness in the community to come forward for the checks. We had to turn away 87 men who called the hospital and a further 50 who contacted Burton Albion as we were oversubscribed.

"We'll be appealing for the commissioners to provide the funding required to make this happen again. If anyone has any concerns about their prostate in the meantime they should go and have a discus-sion with their GP."

John Widdowson, of Burton Albion Community Trust, said: "We're looking at the next steps of how we support this again.

"It was a massive team effort to make this happen and the trust is behind any efforts to do this again and, if possible, expand it."
