Surgeon Jyoti is trust's 'best ambassador'

A surgeon who found new ways of getting men to get their prostate screened by going out into the community has been honoured for her dedication.

Jyoti Shah, a consultant urological surgeon at Burton Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, has worked tirelessly to find ways to get men to take part in prostate cancer screening and introduced a programme at Burton Albion Football Club that proved a huge success.

She has now been awarded the Chief Executive's Pride Award after bosses said she had "contributed hugely to the positive reputation" at the trust, including at national level through her community prostate cancer screening programme.

It was highlighted on BBC1's One Show and won the Brewers the Midlands Community Football Club of the Year award.

Miss Shah was also recognised for her work as editor in chief of Medical Woman and commissioning editor of Annals and Bulletin RCS England.

She also won the Asian Women of Achievement Chairman's Award in 2015. Miss Shah said: "We were

discussing prostate screen-ing in the department and thought we ought to go out in to the community to reach

"It was about breaking down barriers and going out to them.

"We had been to Pirelli Stadium almost two years ago to give a talk at a health event and we met to discuss what would work with them in the future.

'We got planning on taking the clinic out in to the com-munity and agreed to have it at the club. I think that we were all totally surprised by the uptake when we first did

"Out of 113 men that were tested, eight were diagnosed with cancer, but we had to turn 137 away as we only set out to do 50 a day.

"As news spread we started to see a ripple effect and men were talking about their

health.
"It has been a fabulous campaign that has had the desired effect of raising awareness of prostate

'It is because of the work in the community that it has saved all those lives and it has had a domino effect.

"A lot of the work I have

been doing with the writing and the programme is unpaid, as it is something that I believe in and it is the right thing to do. I have even taken a pay cut so I can concentrate on it and have been working evenings and weekends to get it done.

Part of her work includes going in to schools to talk about health and her profession to encourage pupils to get a career in caring if that is what they want to do.

Miss Shah said: "I want the pupils to see that if I can do it, they can do it. I come from a working class background and we didn't have any money and everywhere I went people said I would

never be good enough to get in to medicine.

"I want to give something back and I don't want to discover people are still being told they cannot do it. I was eight years old when I decided that I wanted to be a doctor and coming from a traditional Indian family it wasn't a career that was

befitting.
"You have got to follow your heart but sometimes it can be a very lonely place to

Helen Scott-South, the hospital's chief executive, said: "She inspires the next generation of doctors by going into schools to talk about studying and working in medicine.

"She has set up a prostate cancer support group. She has been repeatedly named as the best speaker at teaching sessions for local GPs. I consider her the best ambassador the trust can have.
"For the prostate screening

programme that has taken place in conjunction with Burton Albion, we have reached a demographic that is usually very difficult to engage with healthcare.

"An inspirational individu-

al who is truly and will continue to #bethebest.

COURT IN BRIEF



Cases heard recently before Southern Derbyshire magistrates

Kirsty Richards, 25, of Shannon Approach, Burton. She admitted assaulting five men in Burton on February 5. Two counts were racially aggravated. She also admitted damaging a van belonging to Staffordshire Police in Burton on March 18. And she admitted assaulting a man which was racially aggravated in Burton on March 18. She was given a four-week prison sentence, suspended for 12 months, due to her drunken behaviour, combination of offences, and racially aggravated offences. She was also given a 16-week curfew, a 12-month restraining order, and ordered to pay £85 court costs, and £450 compensation.

Helene Brown, 44, of Mellowdew Road, Coventry.
She admitted driving at 36mph in Burton Road, Midway, where the speed limit is 30mph, on November 11. She was fined £57 with £85 court costs and a £30 victim surcharge. Her driving licence was endorsed with three points.

Catherine Darragh, 25, of Meschines Street, Coventry.
She admitted she exceeded the 30mph speed limit by driving at 36mph in Burton Road, Woodville, on December 2. She was fined £109, and ordered to pay £85 court costs and a £30 victim surcharge. Her driving licence was endorsed with three points.

Stephen Harrison, 27, of King Street, Enderby, Leicestershire. It was proved that he drove on the A444 Overseal, using a mobile phone, on October 26. He was fined £220 and ordered to pay £85 court costs and a £30 victim surcharge. His driving licence was endorsed with three points.

Daniel Woolley, 32, of Horninglow Road North, Burton. He pleaded guilty to possession of three grams of diamor, hine in Burton on November 7. He was fined £80 and ordered to pay £85 court costs and a £30 victim surcharge.
